MHA becomes Smoke-Free

Middlesex Hospital Alliance – Strathroy Middlesex General Hospital and Four Counties Health Services will become 100% smoke-free effective July 11, 2016.

Regulations filed by the provincial government under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act and the Electronic Cigarettes Act, effective January 1, 2016, bans smoking on all hospital grounds in Ontario, unless designated smoking areas are identified on the premises. MHA elected to designate temporary smoking areas for six months, to afford the opportunity to provide education and support in the transition to a smoke-free workplace. Effective July 11, 2016, there will no longer be a "designated" smoking area anywhere on hospital grounds at Strathroy Middlesex General Hospital (SMGH) or Four Counties Health Services (FCHS). This means that smoking and vaping will not be allowed anywhere on our property, grounds, parking areas or vehicles.

When it comes to the effects of smoking, no organization should be more aware of the perils associated with second hand smoke than the Middlesex Hospital Alliance. In the spirit of the "Smoke-Free Ontario" legislation, we, as an organization, continue to improve the health of our constituents by becoming smoke-free in our buildings and on our properties. Smoke-free grounds are legislated at many public places and most recently on sports fields, and playgrounds. New legislation under the Smoke-Free Ontario Act now poses rules for hospitals that prohibit smoking on hospital property.

"As a leading healthcare provider, it is essential for the Alliance to take a leading role in protecting anyone who comes to our sites from the harmful effects of second hand smoke. Going smoke-free, I believe, sends a clear message to our communities that prevention is as important as treatment of illness and that we, at the Middlesex Hospital Alliance, are committed to providing a safe and healthy environment for everyone," stated T. Stepanuik, MHA President & CEO. "This action clearly demonstrates our commitment to health promotion and disease prevention," he added.

Tobacco smoking is the leading cause of preventable disease, disability and death in Canada, causing 40,000 premature deaths each year.

External signage and internal posters will be installed at both locations to reinforce that MHA is now smoke-free.

Patients who come to our hospitals after July 11, 2016 will be asked to refrain from smoking during their hospital stay. Understandably, if you are a smoker, it may be challenging for you to adjust to this
